The 74th Annual General Body Meeting of the Indian Dairy Association is to be held on August 27, 2026 at 11:00 am through virtual mode.

The minutes have already been circulated to all the members vide our letter No. IDA:73AGBM dated 28th August, 2025 **(PAGE NO. 7-13)** and no comments have been received, therefore, the minutes may be confirmed.

- 3. ANNOUNCEMENT OF 53RD DAIRY INDUSTRY CONFERENCE TO BE ORGANISED BY IDA (WEST ZONE)**

The 53rd Dairy Industry Conference will be organised by IDA (WZ) during 21–23 January, 2027 in Goa. The theme of the Conference is **“Cattle to Kettle – Empowering India's Women Dairy Farmers”**.

- 4. PRESENTATION OF ANNUAL REPORT OF IDA BY THE PRESIDENT**

A brief overview of the major activities and achievements of the Association during the year is presented for the kind consideration of the members. The report highlights IDA's sustained efforts in policy advocacy, stakeholder engagement, knowledge sharing, promotion of sustainable dairy practices, and strengthening of initiatives at both zonal and national levels. These endeavours reflect the Association's continued commitment to advancing the growth, sustainability, and overall development of the Indian dairy sector. **(PAGE NO. 14-45).**

- 5. PRESENTATION OF FINANCIAL REPORT OF THE ASSOCIATION ALONG WITH THE AUDITED STATEMENT OF INCOME AND EXPENDITURE FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 2025-26**

(PAGE NO. 46-66)

The financial report alongwith the consolidated Balance Sheet of IDA and its Zones was approved by the CEC and following resolution was adopted:

RESOLUTION

“Resolved that the consolidated Balance Sheet of IDA including all Zones and Chapters for the financial year 2025-2026 is hereby approved and recommended to be presented for the approval at the 74th AGBM”.

6. APPROVAL OF THE PROPOSED BUDGET OF IDA AND ITS ZONES FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 2027-2028

(PAGE NO. 67-86)

The CEC approved the proposed budget of IDA HQ, Zones/Chapters for the financial year 2027-28 (both capital and revenue) and recommended to be presented at the ensuing 74th AGBM. Accordingly, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLUTION

“Resolved that the proposed budget of IDA HQ, Zones/Chapters for the financial year 2027-28 (both capital and revenue) is hereby approved and recommended to be presented for the approval at the 74th AGBM.”

7. APPROVAL OF THE APPOINTMENT OF AUDITORS AND THEIR REMUNERATION FOR THE YEAR 2027-2028

Auditor of IDA (HQ), M/s SSR & Co. have requested vide their letter dated June 27, 2026 for the enhancement in their remuneration. Their remuneration has not been increased since 2024-25.

Considering that, the CEC approved the proposal of M/s SSR & Co., New Delhi as Auditor of IDA(HQ) for the financial year 2027-2028 with the 10% enhancement in the remuneration to Rs. 62,700/- from existing Rs 57,000/- per annum for annual audits and, Rs. 6,270/- from existing Rs 5,700/- per month for internal audit and for filing TDS/GST Returns. The following resolution was adopted:

RESOLUTION

“Resolved that M/s SSR & Co., New Delhi be appointed as Auditor of IDA(HQ) for the financial year 2027-2028 with the 10% enhancement in the remuneration which comes to Rs. 62,700/- per annum for annual audits and Rs. 6,270/- per month for internal audit and for filing TDS/GST Returns subject to ratification by the AGBM”.

8. APPROVAL OF THE AMENDMENT OF THE MEMORANDUM OF IDA

1. AMENDMENTS TO THE MEMORANDUM OF ASSOCIATION, RULES & REGULATIONS AND BYE-LAWS (PAGE NO. 87-94)

The Constitutional Amendment Committee considered the proposed amendments to the constitutional documents of IDA. It was noted that the constitutional documents were last comprehensively amended in December 2018 and that several subsequent decisions of the CEC had not yet been formally incorporated. The purpose of the proposed amendments is to align the constitutional documents with decisions already approved and to strengthen governance and administrative clarity.

Four amendments were placed before the Committee.

1.1 Revision of Editorial Board Structure

The Committee considered the proposal to replace the existing common Editorial Board with separate Editorial Boards for:

- Indian Journal of Dairy Science (IJDS);
- Indian Dairyman; and
- Dugdh Sarita,

pursuant to approval of CEC meetings held on 6th December, 2025, 17 January, 2026 and 3rd July, 2026.

The proposed structure provides for appropriate representation of the President, CEC members, editors and subject-matter specialists. For Indian Dairyman, the proposed advisory representation also includes members from NDDB, dairy industry, NDRI and other dairy science institutions.

DECISION

The Committee agreed that the proposed revised Chapter 4B relating to Editorial Boards be placed before the AGBM for formal approval and incorporation into the constitutional documents.

1.2 IDA Lifetime Achievement Award

The Committee considered incorporation of the IDA Lifetime Achievement Award, pursuant to CEC Resolution No. 2/2024 dated 1 February 2024. The proposed provision provides for recognition of outstanding and

sustained contribution to the dairy sector, with the award ordinarily to be presented during the inaugural session of the Dairy Industry Conference.

DECISION

The Committee agreed that the provision relating to the IDA Lifetime Achievement Award be placed before the AGBM for formal incorporation into the MOA, Rules & Regulations and Bye-laws.

1.3 Institutional Membership Validity

The Committee considered the proposed rationalisation of institutional membership provisions, pursuant to approval of CEC meeting held on 27th June, 2024.

As per the proposed amendment:

- Sustaining Membership shall remain valid for one year from the date of approval of membership and may thereafter be renewed annually.
- Benefactor Membership shall remain valid for eight years from the date of approval by the competent authority.

DECISION

The Committee agreed that the proposed amendment relating to Institutional Membership validity be placed before the AGBM for formal approval and incorporation.

1.4 Prof. M. R. Srinivasan Memorial Lecture and Oration Award

The Committee considered incorporation of the Prof. M. R. Srinivasan Memorial Lecture and Oration Award, pursuant to CEC Resolution No. 5/2023 dated 15 March 2023.

The proposed provision provides for a Memorial Lecture/Oration by an eminent personality who has made distinguished contributions to dairy science, technology, development, management or allied disciplines.

DECISION

The Committee agreed that the provision relating to the Prof. M. R. Srinivasan Memorial Lecture and Oration Award be placed before the AGBM for formal incorporation.

CONSOLIDATED DECISION ON MOA AMENDMENTS

After detailed consideration, the Committee agreed that all four amendments should be placed before the forthcoming Annual General Body Meeting (AGBM) for formal approval and incorporation into the Memorandum of Association, Rules & Regulations and Bye-laws. It was noted that these amendments arise from decisions already approved by the competent bodies of the Association and are intended to bring the constitutional documents in line with the governance and administrative practices of IDA.

**MINUTES OF THE 73rd ANNUAL GENERAL BODY MEETING (AGBM)
OF INDIAN DAIRY ASSOCIATION HELD ON July 26, 2025
THROUGH VIRTUAL MODE**

The 73rd AGBM of IDA was held on 26th July, 2025 at 11.00 am through virtual mode. The proceedings of the meeting started with President asked to Secretary General to confirm the required quorum of 50 members for the meeting. The Secretary General confirmed that total 100 members have joined, out of which 92 members joined virtually and 8 have joined physically. The President formally declared the AGBM open.

1. WELCOME ADDRESS BY THE PRESIDENT, IDA.

The 73rd Annual General Body Meeting (AGBM) of the Indian Dairy Association (IDA) commenced with a welcome address by the President, who warmly greeted all members present.

The meeting began with homage to four IDA members who passed away during the year since the previous AGBM:

1. Shri Ravindra Apate
2. Shri Ajay Kumar Sharma
3. Dr. Mukti Nath Sinha
4. Dr. E. Madhavan

Members observed a moment of silence in their memory.

The President then requested members to:

- Confirm the confidentiality of the proceedings.
- Confirm whether they had received the agenda papers.
- Confirm that they were able to see, hear, and follow the proceedings.

The members present, confirmed by voice that they have received the agenda and able to follow the proceedings of the AGBM.

Opening Remarks by the President

The President reiterated that IDA is the apex industry association representing the world's largest and fastest-growing dairy sector. He emphasized that whether members represent industry, farmers, equipment manufacturers, or academia, the collective objective is to maintain India's leadership in dairying.

He outlined key focus areas for the Association:

- Ensuring that policy frameworks, food laws, and other relevant regulations support the growth of milk production and the dairy industry.
- Encouraging research, innovation, business development, and supply chain efficiency.
- Engaging in policy advocacy and lobbying with the government, ministries, and other agencies whenever required.

The President shared that over the past few years, IDA has actively intervened on policy matters and achieved positive outcomes.

Industry Situation Update

Referring to the previous year's (72nd AGBM) concerns about surplus dairy commodities, the President informed members that:

- Stocks are now comfortable and prices for both farmers and consumers have stabilised.
- Feed and input costs have declined, improving farmer margins.
- Milk procurement by both private and cooperative sectors has increased by 10–20%.
- Consumption growth, at 2–3% annually, remains healthy.

He mentioned about the changing market scenario and the rapid increase in brands, fuelled by digital commerce and improved distribution. While consumers benefit from wider choices, established brands face pressure to maintain market share.

The President noted that India became the world leader in milk production due to a supply chain model that balanced farmer and consumer interests. Today, that balance is under strain, with the gap between farmer price and consumer price widening to ¹ 15 per litre, meaning farmers receive only about 65% of the consumer price.

Policy Advocacy Updates

- GST on Ghee: IDA has been actively lobbying for rationalisation of GST on ghee, with strong industry support. Members were requested to reinforce this demand during interactions with government bodies.
- Free Trade Agreements (FTAs): IDA successfully advocated for excluding dairy products from trade negotiations, including with the USA, protecting the livelihoods of 80 million dairy farmers and ensuring food security.

Membership and Organisational Outreach

The President encouraged members to actively participate in IDA activities and help expand membership, noting significant growth but uneven geographic representation.

Vice President, Shri Ajay Kumar Khosla emphasised the need to enhance IDA's outreach, including through regional conferences and stronger engagement via social media. He reported an addition of 1,000 new members in the past year and a healthy financial surplus of Rs. 7.5 crore over expenditure from successful conferences in last 3 years.

Vice President, Shri Arun Patil echoed these points, highlighting vibrant zone- and chapter-level activities that have strengthened IDA's presence nationwide.

CEC Member Shri Ramchandra Chaudhary requested that IDA also pursue GST reduction on molasses, a key animal feed ingredient. The President assured him this would be taken up.

2. CONFIRMATION OF THE MINUTES OF THE 72ND ANNUAL GENERAL BODY MEETING HELD ON AUGUST 10, 2024

The minutes have already been circulated to all the members vide IDA letter No. IDA:72AGBM dated August 27, 2024 to which no comments have been received. The minutes were accordingly confirmed.

3. ANNOUNCEMENT OF 52nd DAIRY INDUSTRY CONFERENCE TO BE ORGANISED BY IDA (NORTH ZONE).

The Secretary General announced that the 52nd DIC will be hosted by IDA North Zone at the Yashobhoomi Convention Centre, Dwarka, New Delhi, from 12-14 February 2026, with the theme:

“Empowering Rural India through Dairy Entrepreneurship”

Members were requested to promote the event within the industry.

The proposal of IDA (North Zone) to organise the 52nd Dairy Industry Conference at Yashobhoomi Convention Centre, Dwarka, New Delhi, from 12-14 February 2026 was considered and approved by the AGBM and adopted following Resolution:

RESOLUTION NO. 73/1

“Resolved that the proposal of IDA (North Zone) for organising the 52nd Dairy Industry Conference at Yashobhoomi Convention Centre, Dwarka, New Delhi, from 12-14 February 2026, is hereby approved.”

4. PRESENTATION OF ANNUAL REPORT OF IDA BY THE PRESIDENT.

The President shared key highlights:

The President informed the House that, for the first time in the history of the Dairy Industry Conference (DIC), the stage was shared by Shri Rajiv Ranjan Singh alias Lalan Singh, Hon'ble Union Minister of Fisheries, Animal Husbandry & Dairying, GoI; Prof. S.P. Singh Baghel, Minister of State, FAH&D, GoI; Smt. Alka Upadhyaya, Secretary, DAHD, GoI; Smt. Varsha Joshi, Additional Secretary (CDD/IT), DAHD, GoI; Dr. N. Vijaya Lakshmi, Additional Chief Secretary, Government of Bihar; and Dr. Meenesh Shah,

Chairman, NDDDB. The 51st DIC, held in Patna, was attended by 2,500 delegates from across the country.

- Strong policy advocacy through CII, FICCI, IDF, and government ministries.
- Timely rebuttals to misinformation from groups such as PETA and plant-based product promoters, along with positive publicity for milk and milk products.
- IDA delegation participation in IDF World Dairy Summit and IDF Regional Dairy Summit (Kochi).
- Indian Journal of Dairy Science achieved a NAAS rating of 6.2 – congratulations to Editor Dr. Bimlesh Mann.
- National Milk Day celebrated nationwide.
- Significant growth in life membership due to introduction of a direct lifetime category.
- Strong social media engagement and hosting of international delegations from China and France.

The members approved the Annual Report and adopted the following resolution:

Resolution No. 73/2

“Resolved that the Annual Report for the year 2024-2025 presented at the 73rd Annual General Body Meeting (AGBM) is hereby approved”.

5. PRESENTATION OF FINANCIAL REPORT OF THE ASSOCIATION ALONGWITH THE AUDITED STATEMENT OF INCOME AND EXPENDITURE FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 2024-2025

Shri Hariom Gulati, Secretary General of IDA presented the financial report for the year 2024-25 alongwith audited statement.

The General Body approved the Financial Report and adopted the following resolution:

Resolution No. 73/3

“Resolved that the consolidated Audited Financial Report of IDA(HQ) including all Zones and Chapters for the financial year 2024-2025 is hereby approved.”

6. APPROVAL OF THE PROPOSED BUDGET OF IDA(HQ) AND ITS ZONES/CHAPTERS FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 2026-2027

The Proposed Budget of IDA(HQ) including all the four Zones/Chapters for the financial year 2026-2027 (both capital and revenue) was presented by the Secretary General of IDA. The General body approved the proposed budget and adopted the following resolution:

Resolution No. 73/4

“Resolved that the proposed budget of Indian Dairy Association (HQ) including all the Zones/Chapters for the financial year 2026-2027 (both capital and revenue) is hereby approved.

7. APPROVAL OF THE APPOINTMENT OF AUDITORS AND THEIR REMUNERATION FOR THE YEAR 2026-2027.

The Secretary General informed the House that the appointed auditor had requested a 15% increase in remuneration for the current year. However, the Secretariat decided to maintain the remuneration at the same level as the previous year. It was further noted that the request for an increase will be reconsidered in the next financial year.

The appointment of M/s SSR & Co., New Delhi as the auditors of IDA(HQ) for the financial year 2026-2027 was approved by the AGBM and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolution No. 73/5

“Resolved that M/s. SSR & Co., New Delhi be appointed as auditors of IDA for the financial year 2026-2027 at a same remuneration of Rs. 57,000/- per annum for annual audits and Rs. 5,700/- per month for internal audit and for filing TDS/GST Returns.”

8. ANY OTHER MATTER BROUGHT TO THE NOTICE OF THE PRESIDENT, PROVIDED IT HAS BEEN BROUGHT WITH 7 DAYS PRIOR NOTICE.

8.1 Amendment in Memorandum of Association of IDA:

The Secretary General apprised the House that two communications had been received—one from Dr. P.I. Geevarghese and another from Mr. Verma —regarding the revision of the Memorandum of Association (MOA) of IDA. Both had suggested extensive edits to the MOA. However, when these were presented to the Constitution Amendment Committee, it was found difficult to review the entire document at once. The Committee recommended that only selected clauses, along with the rationale for their amendment and the proposed new wording, should be presented for discussion. This approach would help expedite the review and approval process.

Mr. G.P. Verma pointed out that one pressing issue in the MOA amendment is the clear definition of hierarchy, including lateral movement across various positions. He also raised other matters, such as the number of days for membership eligibility and participation in the DIC by ordinary members. He emphasized that there should be a rule stating that an ordinary member may participate in the DIC only once in tenor of one year of membership, and this should be clearly documented to remove ambiguity.

Dr. Geevarghese addressed the House, reiterating the importance of certain changes he had been advocating for some time. The President advised the Secretary General to identify priority clauses from the documents submitted by Dr. Varghese and Mr. Verma, prepare an agenda, and convene a Committee meeting to process them on priority.

8.2 The members discussed following points during the meeting:

1. Dairy Industry Data Collection

The President informed the House that, in the previous CEC meeting held on 21st June 2025, a committee had been formed to plan the collection of data from the dairy industry, covering both cooperative and private dairies. NDRI has offered to support in conducting this study for the IDA. The objective is to compile comprehensive industry data to facilitate better planning and decision-making. He further emphasized that this study is directed toward IDA's core purpose of disseminating information and knowledge about the dairy industry. This data collection initiative forms an important part of that mission.

2. Publicity and Outreach

Shri Ramchandra Chaudhary suggested that IDA should place greater emphasis on publicity and outreach to ensure its presence is more visible to members and the wider community. Following discussions, it was agreed that IDA should consider appointing a Public Relations (PR) agency to enhance its outreach and media coverage.

3. Cloud-based accounting platform

The Auditor presented his observations and recommended that all zones and chapters adopt a unified, cloud-based accounting platform. It was discussed to implement cloud-based services for accounting across all zones and chapters. Shri Sudhir Singh, Chairman of IDA East Zone, suggested that NDS has already developed a similar service, which could be utilized by IDA.

4. IDA Election Status

On the update of the IDA election, the Secretary General informed that a three-member Election Committee of the CEC had been formed, consisting of Mr. Divya Sharma (OSD, NDDB) as Returning Officer, Dr. Deep Narayan Yadav (NDRI), and the Secretary General, who serves as Secretary to the Committee. Mr. G.P. Verma highlighted that, as per the Constitution, all Committee members must be IDA members. It was decided that the Secretary General would become member of IDA immediately, with CEC approval to be obtained through circulation.

5. Objectives of IDA

Mr. Kuldeep Sharma raised the issue that “policy and advocacy” was not included in IDA’s objectives. He suggested that IDA’s representation should extend to all

government bodies related to dairy, such as the Department of Animal Husbandry and FSSAI. Sh Ajay Khosla agreed that this objective should be added to the MOA.

6. Agricultural status to dairy and animal husbandry

Mr. Anil Hatkar informed that the Government of Maharashtra had granted agricultural status to dairy and animal husbandry. The President requested him to share the official notification, as IDA had not received it. Once obtained, IDA could write to other states on similar lines, referring to the document.

7. Public awareness of milk products

Dr. J.V. Parekh called for increased public awareness of milk products by the industry. The President clarified that such campaigns should be initiated by the industry itself, with IDA offering guidance and support. He requested Dr. Parekh to mobilize industry representatives to plan such initiatives.

8. Publishing articles in the *Indian Journal of Dairy Science*

Dr. Parekh noted that the waiting time for publishing articles in the *Indian Journal of Dairy Science* was eight to ten months. Dr. Bimlesh Mann, the Editor, explained that the delay was due to a high volume of submissions and the journal being published only six times a year. Increasing the frequency to twelve issues annually could reduce the waiting time, but this would require a meeting of the Editorial Board for a decision.

9. CLOSING REMARKS

The President extended gratitude to the Ministry of Fisheries, Animal Husbandry & Dairying, Ministry of Food Processing, and Ministry of Finance for their continued support. Appreciation was also conveyed to NDDB, NDRI, and all collaborators for their valuable contributions. The President acknowledged the dedicated efforts of CEC Members, Zonal and Chapter Leaders, and the IDA Secretariat in furthering the Association's objectives.

The President reaffirmed IDA's commitment to supporting Indian dairy farmers, promoting sustainable practices, and advocating for policies that safeguard the interests of the dairy sector. He expressed optimism for the successful hosting of the 52nd Dairy Industry Conference in Delhi, February 2026, by the North Zone, with the theme: "Empowering Rural India through Dairy Entrepreneurship."

The President concluded the 73rd AGBM.

ANNUAL REPORT OF IDA

Dear Fellow Members,

It is my honour to present the Annual Report of the Indian Dairy Association (IDA) at the 74th Annual General Body Meeting, being held virtually on August 27, 2026.

Over the past year, IDA has continued to work diligently towards its mission, with unwavering commitment and purpose. The coordinated efforts of the Head Office and all the zones and chapters have been instrumental in the effective implementation of our various initiatives and programmes.

A summary of the key activities and achievements during the year is outlined below for your kind consideration.

Webinar on Front-of-Pack Nutrition Labelling (FOPNL)

To discuss the implications of the proposed Front-of-Pack Nutrition Labelling (FOPNL) system for dairy products, IDA organized an exclusive webinar on **29 August 2025**.

The webinar examined concerns regarding Health Star Rating (HSR) and HFSS classification, highlighting that rating systems based primarily on saturated fat or sugar may unfairly penalize nutritionally valuable foods such as milk and curd. Experts emphasized the importance of considering the complete food matrix rather than isolated nutrients. Discussions also highlighted inconsistencies in star ratings assigned to dairy products compared with certain processed beverages.

Indian Delegation at IDF World Dairy Summit 2025



The **IDF World Dairy Summit 2025**, held in **Santiago, Chile (20–23 October 2025)**, focused on the theme "**Nourishing a Sustainable World.**"

India was represented by a large delegation comprising officials from NDDB, state dairy federations, milk producer organizations, Mother Dairy, NCDFI, and the Indian Dairy Association. **Shri R.K. Chugh** and **Shri Madhav Patgaonkar** represented IDA.

During the IDF General Assembly, **Dr. Meenesh Shah**, Chairman, NDDB, formally invited delegates to participate in the **IDF World Dairy Summit 2027**, which will be hosted in Mumbai, India.

New Central Executive Committee Assumes Charge

The newly elected Central Executive Committee of IDA assumed office on **6 December 2025** under the leadership of **Shri Sudhir Kumar Singh**, who took over as President from **Dr. R.S. Sodhi**.



A distinguished dairy professional with over four decades of experience, Shri Singh has played a significant role in strengthening dairy cooperatives, modernizing operations, promoting farmer-centric initiatives, and expanding IDA's organizational network. IDA expressed confidence that his leadership would further strengthen the Association's role in advancing India's dairy sector.

Felicitation Programmes for President-IDA

52nd Dairy Industry Conference (DIC)

The **52nd Dairy Industry Conference (DIC)** was held at **Yashobhoomi Convention Centre, New Delhi**, from **12–14 February 2026** on the theme "**Empowering Rural India through Dairy Entrepreneurship.**"

The conference attracted over **2,000 delegates**, while the accompanying Dairy Expo featured **210 exhibitors** and drew more than **20,000 visitors**.



The conference was inaugurated by **Shri Chirag Paswan**, Hon'ble Union Minister of Food Processing Industries, while **Prof. S.P. Singh Baghel**,

Hon'ble Minister of State for Fisheries, Animal Husbandry and Dairying, inaugurated the Dairy Expo.

Distinguished speakers included **Shri Sudhir Kumar Singh, Dr. Meenesh Shah, Dr. Dheer Singh, Mr. Gilles Froment, and Ms. Laurence Rycken**, who discussed dairy entrepreneurship, sustainability, technological innovation, productivity enhancement, climate resilience, exports, and global cooperation.

The conference featured:

- Memorial lectures in honour of Dr. Verghese Kurien and Prof. M.R. Srinivasan.
- Technical sessions covering dairy production, processing, quality, sustainability, and entrepreneurship.
- Poster presentations by young researchers.
- Awards for outstanding dairy professionals, women dairy farmers, research papers, and best posters.
- Dairy technology exhibition showcasing the latest innovations.

The event concluded with the ceremonial handover of the conference torch to the IDA West Zone, which will host the **53rd Dairy Industry Conference** in Goa.

President-IDA Addresses National Symposium at MAFSU

Shri Sudhir Kumar Singh addressed the **2nd National Veterinary, Dairy & Fisheries Symposium 2026** at **Maharashtra Animal and Fishery Sciences University (MAFSU), Nagpur** as the Lead Speaker.

The symposium focused on the **"Integrated One Health Approach: Strengthening Veterinary, Dairy & Fisheries Sectors for Rural Resilience."**

In his address, Shri Singh emphasized dairy's role in improving rural livelihoods, increasing farmers' incomes, and promoting sustainable development through integrated animal health, technology adoption, and cooperative growth. He highlighted the importance of innovation, entrepreneurship, and scientific advancement in shaping the future of India's dairy sector.



Policy Advocacy and Government Engagement

Policy advocacy remained one of the key pillars of the Indian Dairy Association's activities during 2025–26. As the apex body representing India's dairy sector, IDA actively engaged with the Government of India, regulatory authorities, policy makers and other stakeholders to present the industry's perspective on matters impacting dairy farmers, processors, cooperatives, private dairies and consumers. Through structured consultations, technical submissions and stakeholder interactions, the Association worked towards creating an enabling policy environment for the sustainable growth and global competitiveness of the Indian dairy sector.

During the year, IDA actively participated in consultations organized by the **Ministry of Food Processing Industries (MoFPI)** and submitted comprehensive recommendations for strengthening the Production Linked Incentive (PLI) Scheme for the dairy sector. The Association advocated for the inclusion of additional value-added dairy products under future PLI schemes to encourage investments in advanced processing, product diversification, import substitution and export-oriented manufacturing. Special emphasis was placed on promoting high-value products such as specialty cheeses, whey-based ingredients and other innovative dairy products capable of enhancing India's competitiveness in global markets.

IDA continued its close engagement with the **Department of Animal Husbandry & Dairying (DAHD)** by providing industry inputs on key developmental initiatives, including the National Programme for Dairy Development (NPDD), strengthening dairy infrastructure, productivity enhancement, milk quality improvement and value chain development. The Association also supported initiatives aimed at improving processing capacity, cold chain infrastructure and farmer-centric dairy development programmes.

Food safety and regulatory reforms remained an important focus area. IDA made detailed representations before the **Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI)** on various regulatory issues, including the proposed Front-of-Pack Nutrition Labelling (FoPNL) framework. The Association emphasized the need for dairy products to be evaluated on the basis of their unique nutritional profile and advocated for a science-based, evidence-driven regulatory approach that appropriately recognizes the nutritional significance of milk and milk products.

Recognizing the growing importance of international trade, IDA actively engaged with the **Ministry of Commerce & Industry** and participated in consultations relating to export promotion, market access and Free Trade Agreements (FTAs). The Association highlighted the opportunities and

challenges for the Indian dairy sector in emerging global markets and recommended policy measures to improve export competitiveness while safeguarding the interests of domestic dairy farmers and processors.

IDA also represented the industry's concerns before the Government regarding the rationalization of the **Goods and Services Tax (GST)** on dairy products. The Association advocated for a more balanced tax structure, including the rationalization of GST on ghee and other dairy products, with the objective of reducing tax anomalies, encouraging value addition and improving the overall competitiveness of the sector.

As part of its continuing engagement with national trade policy, IDA participated in deliberations of the **Board of Trade**, where it presented the dairy industry's perspective on export competitiveness, value addition, market diversification and the policy measures required to strengthen India's position in international dairy trade.

The Association also contributed to consultations on product standards, quality assurance and technical specifications with organizations such as the **Bureau of Indian Standards (BIS)** and other regulatory bodies. These interactions aimed to ensure that evolving standards remain practical, scientifically robust and aligned with the interests of both consumers and the dairy industry.

During the year, IDA submitted memoranda, technical background papers and policy recommendations to **Parliamentary Committees** and various Government departments on issues concerning dairy development, food processing, value addition, nutrition, trade and regulatory reforms. These submissions reflected the collective expertise of the Association and its members and provided evidence-based recommendations to support informed policy formulation.

In addition to engagements at the national level, IDA worked closely with several **State Governments** through its Zones and Branches by participating in policy consultations, technical meetings and dairy development programmes. These collaborative efforts contributed to strengthening state-level dairy ecosystems through knowledge sharing, policy support and industry participation.

Through its sustained advocacy initiatives, the Indian Dairy Association continued to serve as the unified voice of India's dairy sector, fostering constructive dialogue between industry and Government while contributing to policy decisions that support sustainable growth, technological advancement, farmer prosperity and enhanced global competitiveness of the Indian dairy industry.

IDA (South Zone) Activities (2025–2026)

During August 2025–July 2026, IDA-South Zone conducted several key activities, including four ZEC meetings held at Bengaluru, Kozhikode, and through an online platform, along with the 61st Annual General Body Meeting at Koramangala Club, Bengaluru. IDA-SZ organized the National Symposium on “Viksit Bharat: Challenges, Opportunities and Way Forward for the Indian Dairy Sector” on National Milk Day 2025 in association with ICAR-NDRI, SRS and Alumni Association of SRS, NDRI. A National Seminar on “Ayurveda-driven Innovation in Dairy Foods” and the Dr. K. K. Iya Memorial Lecture were conducted on World Milk Day 2026 in association with ICAR-NIANP.

The Southern Dairy and Food Conclave–2026 was successfully organized at Kozhikode, Kerala, along with the Best Women Dairy Farmers Award Ceremony 2026 to recognize women dairy farmers from southern states. IDA-SZ also completed elections for the IDA Karnataka State Chapter, IDA Andhra Pradesh State Chapter, and IDA South Zone, ensuring smooth transition to newly elected committees.

World Milk Day 2026 Celebration

ICAR-NIANP and IDA (South Zone) jointly celebrated **World Milk Day 2026** on **17 June 2026** by organizing a National Seminar on "**Ayurveda-driven Innovation in Dairy Foods.**"

A policy paper titled "**Reimagining Dairying in Southern India: Integrating Sustainability, Technology & Entrepreneurship**" was released during the programme.



Kerala State Chapter

World Milk Day 2025 Celebrations

IDA Kerala State Chapter, in association with VKIDFT, Mannuthy, celebrated World Milk Day from 30 May to 2 June 2025 with competitions, cultural events, expert talks, and student activities. Dr. Mahendra Singh, Chairman, IDA-HSC, welcomed the Chief Guest, **Dr. M.L. Madan**, Padma Shri awardee and former DDG (Animal Sciences), along with participating dairy farmers.



Dr. Mahendra Singh demonstrated the preparation of balanced concentrate feed using locally available ingredients and highlighted the importance of routine mineral mixture supplementation in improving milk yield, reproductive efficiency, immunity, and milk quality. He also shared winter management practices, including balanced feeding, adequate bedding, energy-rich rations, lukewarm water, and green fodder to sustain productivity.

Dr. M.L. Madan encouraged farmers to adopt scientific dairy practices such as silage making, use of elite and sexed semen, IVF, embryo transfer, and proper record-keeping to enhance productivity and profitability. He emphasized the need for timely breeding and modern reproductive technologies to strengthen India's dairy sector.

Dr. Parveen Kumar, Member (RE), IDA-HSC, explained that the programme aimed to familiarize farmers with modern technologies for improving milk production and reproductive performance.

Around **60 dairy farmers** participated in interactive discussions on feeding, breeding, animal health, and farm management. **DISCLOSURE TO AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF INDIAN DAIRY
ASSOCIATION (CONSOLIDATED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED ON MARCH 31, 2026**

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND NOTES ON ACCOUNTS

1. **Legal status of the Organization:** Indian Dairy Association is a Society registered under Societies Registration Act on 23rd September 1976. This society is engaged in spreading scientific information, holding seminars, publishing journals for the benefit of Dairy producers, Dairy fraternity.
2. **Basis of preparation of financial statements:** The financial statements have been prepared under historical cost conventions and on accrual basis of accounting and comply with Generally Accepted Accounting Principle unless otherwise stated.
3. **Fixed Assets:** The Fixed Assets are stated at their original cost of acquisition including taxes, duties, freight and other incidental expenses relating to the acquisition and installation of the concerned assets. The sponsorship /grant received against specific assets have been adjusted against the cost incurred for generating the respective asset.
4. **Depreciation.** Depreciation is provided on written down value method at the rates prescribed in Income Tax Act. Depreciation / amortization on the assets (including intangibles) purchased during the year is to be provided at half of the rates as mentioned below in case the assets are used for less than 180 days in the year. Freehold land is not subject to depreciation.
5. **Revenue.** Recognition. Income from Seminar & Conference Receipts, Rental, Advertisement Receipts and interest on deposits are recognized on accrual basis. Grant/ Donations/ Membership fee are recognized on receipt basis.
6. **Leases.** Leases where the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased term, are classified as operating leases. Operating lease payments are recognized as an expense in the Income and Expenditure account on a straight-line basis.
7. **Employee Benefits:**
 - a. During the financial year the management contributes to Employee Provident Fund for all the confirmed employees. PF contribution is accounted on actual liability basis and paid to the government managed Employee Provident Fund Organization.
 - b. No provision has been made in the accounts for Gratuity and Retirement Benefits for the employees. Management informs that the payment of the gratuity and other Retirement Benefits is accounted for on cash basis. Hence no such provision made during the year.
 - c. Leave encashment is treated as short term benefit and is recognized /paid on yearly basis. Hence No provision is required.
8. No Salary /Remuneration /other benefit have been paid to any member of the CEC/ governing body.



9. Previous year figures have been reclassified/ re-grouped wherever considered necessary.
10. **Impairment of Assets.** The Trust assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If any such indication exists, the trust estimates the recoverable amount of the asset. If such recoverable amount of the asset or recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs is less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount is reduced to its recoverable amount. The reduction is treated as an impairment loss and is recognized in the income and expenditure account. If at the balance sheet date there is an indication that if a previously assessed impairment loss no longer exists, the recoverable amount is reassessed and the asset is reflected at the recoverable amount subject to a maximum of depreciated historical cost.
11. **Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets.** A provision is recognized when the trust has a present obligation as a result of past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which reliable estimate can be made. 12. In the opinion of the CEC, the current assets, loans & advances will realize a value not less than the amounts stated in the Balance Sheet, if realized in the ordinary course of business.

Approval of the Amendment of the Memorandum of IDA

1. Background

The Memorandum of Association, Rules & Regulations and Bye-laws of the Indian Dairy Association were last comprehensively amended on **15 December 2018**. Since then, the Central Executive Committee (CEC) and the Annual General Body Meeting (AGBM) have, from time to time, approved various policy decisions, governance reforms and administrative improvements requiring consequential amendments to the constitutional documents of the Association.

A comprehensive review of the Memorandum of Association, Rules & Regulations and Bye-laws, together with the proceedings of the CEC and AGBM held during the period **2019–2026**, has revealed that while several amendments have been approved in principle by the competent authority, they have not yet been formally incorporated into the constitutional documents of the Association.

The proposed amendments are intended to:

- strengthen the governance framework of the Association;
- align the constitutional provisions with decisions already approved by the CEC/AGBM;
- improve administrative efficiency and remove procedural ambiguities;
- modernise provisions relating to publications, membership and governance; and
- maintain an updated and legally consistent Memorandum of Association.

Accordingly, the Central Executive Committee recommends that the following amendments be approved by the Annual General Body for incorporation into the Memorandum of Association, Rules & Regulations and Bye-laws.

The Editorial Board shall function for all publications of the Association.

(g) Six to eight subject matter specialists, who may be invited by the President to constitute the Editorial Advisory Board and participate in meetings as and when required.

Rule 4B.2 – Editorial Board of Indian Dairyman

There shall be a separate Editorial Board for *Indian Dairyman* consisting of:

- (a) President of IDA – Chairman;
- (b) Two members of the Central Executive Committee nominated by the CEC;
- (c) Editor-in-Chief;
- (d) Editor;
- (e) Secretary General/Secretary of IDA;
- (f) Six to eight subject matter specialists who may be invited by the President to constitute the Editorial Advisory Board and participate in meetings as and when required, including:
 - (i) Three members from NDDB nominated by the Chairman, NDDB;
 - (ii) One member from the dairy industry;
 - (iii) One member from NDRI;
 - (iv) One member from other Dairy Science Institutions.

Rule 4B.3 – Editorial Board of Dugdh Sarita

There shall be a separate Editorial Board for *Dugdh Sarita* consisting of:

- (a) President of IDA – Chairman;
- (b) Two members of the Central Executive Committee nominated by the CEC;
- (c) Editor-in-Chief;
- (d) Editor;
- (e) Secretary General/Secretary of IDA;
- (f) Six to eight subject matter specialists, who may be invited by the President to constitute the Editorial Advisory Board and participate in meetings as and when required.

Existing Provision

Rule 4B.3 / 4B.4

The Editorial Board shall hold office for a period coterminous with the tenure of the Central Executive Committee. The nominated members may be substituted by the CEC on the recommendation of the President.

Rule 4B.4 / 4B.5

The Editorial Board shall advise the Editors, decide upon publication matters, and its decisions regarding acceptance or rejection of material shall be final. Members may act as referees and scrutinizers, and Editors may seek assistance from specialists.

Rule 4B.5

The Editorial Board may lay down broad policy matters relating to the journals and other publications of the Association.

Proposed Provision

Rule 4B.4

The Editorial Boards constituted under Rules 4B.1, 4B.2 and 4B.3 shall hold office for a period coterminous with the tenure of the Central Executive Committee. The nominated members may, however, be substituted by the CEC on the recommendation of the President.

Rule 4B.5

The Editorial Boards shall decide upon matters relating to their respective publications. The decision of the concerned Editorial Board regarding acceptance or rejection of any material submitted for publication shall be final. Members of the Editorial Boards may act as referees and scrutinizers, and the Editors may seek assistance from subject experts whenever required.

Rule 4B.6

The Editorial Boards may lay down principles and provide guidance on broad policy matters relating to their respective journals and publications of the Association, consistent with the objectives and policies approved by the Central Executive Committee.

Justification

The existing Memorandum provides for a **single common Editorial Board** for all publications of the Association. Over time, the *Indian Journal of Dairy Science*, *Indian Dairyman* and *Dugdh Sarita* have evolved into publications with distinct objectives, readership and editorial requirements. The Central Executive Committee therefore recommended the constitution of **separate Editorial Boards** for each publication, with appropriate academic, professional and institutional representation, while retaining common provisions regarding tenure, powers and editorial policy. This amendment strengthens editorial governance and aligns the Association's publication framework with contemporary professional publishing practices.

Insertion of Bye-law 16(vii) – IDA Lifetime Achievement Award

16(vii) IDA Lifetime Achievement Award

The Indian Dairy Association may confer the **IDA Lifetime Achievement Award** upon an individual in recognition of outstanding and sustained contribution towards the growth and development of the dairy sector in India over a distinguished professional career.

The Award shall be one of the highest honours conferred by the Association and shall ordinarily be presented during the inaugural session of the Dairy Industry Conference.

The recipient shall possess an exemplary record of professional achievement, leadership, innovation, integrity and service to the dairy sector, and shall normally have rendered not less than **thirty (30) years** of distinguished service in the field of dairying or allied disciplines. The Award shall also recognize significant contributions towards technological advancement, institutional development, policy advocacy, education, research, industry development and social impact in the dairy sector.

Nominations for the Award may be made in such manner and form as may be prescribed by the Central Executive Committee from time to time.

The recipient shall be selected by the **Board of Adjudication** constituted by the Central Executive Committee. The recommendations of the Board of Adjudication shall be placed before the Central Executive Committee for approval, and the decision of the Central Executive Committee shall be final and binding.

The detailed eligibility criteria, nomination procedure, evaluation methodology and other operational guidelines for the Award shall be prescribed by the Central Executive Committee and may be amended from time to time without requiring further amendment to these Bye-laws.

The selection of the Orator/Awardee and the detailed eligibility criteria, nomination process, evaluation procedure and other operational guidelines shall be such as may be prescribed by the Central Executive Committee from time to time.
